### DIRECTIONS

From NJ Turnpike Exit 12: At the tollbooth, bear to the extreme right, and keep bearing to the EXTREME right at the ramp, following the signs to RAHWAY. The off ramp will put you on Roosevelt Ave. You will pass a Holiday Inn on your right. The third traffic light (about ¼ mile) is Blair Road (BP station on the SE corner). Left onto Blair Road and proceed past the first traffic light, staying on Blair Road into the Industrial Park. After about ¾ of a mile from the light, the road narrows, and you will cross a freight RR track. Shortly thereafter the road curves right. Stay to the extreme right, which is Port Reading Ave, go another two blocks, and turn right into the parking lot.

From other routes: NJ TPK Exit 11, Southbound GSP exit 129, Northbound GSP Exit 127, follow to Route 9 North. Once on Route 9, take Main St. Woodbridge Exit (Route 514). Turn right and go 1 mile to railroad overpass. Look for monument. Turn left BEFORE monument and continue on route 514 East. Go to 2nd traffic light and turn right onto Port Reading Ave. Club is ¼ mile on left.

From 287: Stay southbound, past exit 1 and NJ Tpk exit, and take the Route 9 North exit. Once on Route 9, take the Main St. Woodbridge Exit, and proceed as above.

## The Power of Distribution I

[This article was published in the Declarer some years ago. It is reprinted here along with a new, follow-up article (see next page). – Ed.]

Although high card points serve as a guide, the power of distribution can more than compensate for a lack of points (often referred to as “shape”). While playing in an Allendale sectional, I picked up ♠Q842, ♥8, ♦AQ8753, ♣A4 in first chair. I opened 1♦ at favorable vulnerability, LHO passed and my partner bid 3♦ (pre-emptive). My RHO emphatically pulled the “Stop” card from his bidding box and bid 4♥. Sitting with (at most) two to three defensive tricks, and since partner did not promise *any*, I bid 5♦. LHO now bid 5♥, partner bid 6♦, double by RHO, and all passed. The bidding had been:

South	West	North	East
1♦	Pass	3♦	4♥
5♦	5♥	6♦	DbI

All Pass

LHO led a Heart and partner tabled a hand with four HCP but tremendous distribution: ♠7, ♥–, ♦109642, ♣KJ98765 (see complete hand at right).

I ruffed the opening Heart lead, and when the ♦10 was led from dummy, RHO played the King, I played the Ace, and LHO dropped the Jack. With Diamonds 1-1, and Clubs 3-1, I set up the Clubs with a 3<sup>rd</sup> round ruff, and got to dummy with the ♦9; the remaining four Clubs provided pitches for all of the losing Spades, and I claimed 7 for +1140, and a “top” board. Ironically, it takes a Spade lead to hold the contract to 6, despite the fact that the hands, combined, contain only 14 “working” HCP and 16 total points.

It is interesting to note that:

- 1) 4♥ by my opponents is cold.
- 2) They would have done well *not* to bid over 5♦, rather than drive us to the cold slam.
- 3) 6♥ would have been a good vulnerable “save,” despite the fact that my RHO held 20 HCPs.

Therefore, the lesson to be learned is, do *not* be a rigid “point counter.” Distribution can be a tremendous ally, and can compensate for a lack of HCPs, particularly with trump length in both hands and what is often referred to as the “magic of the double fit.” In this hand, note the power of the “double fit”; i.e., a combined eleven Diamonds and nine Clubs, and all the working points in the two suits, which justified partner’s decision to “bid one more.”

## The Power of Distribution II

Some years ago, I wrote an article for this publication about a remarkable hand, in which slam was cold, and which my partner and I bid on 16 high card points. Such “freak” hands come up rarely, but I received many comments questioning the article’s relevance, and about how rare such an event occurs. That argument is belied by two hands that arose in the same evening in “The Common Game” on November 7<sup>th</sup>, 2016.

However, the saying “6/5, come alive” is important, and “shape” can be more important than HCPs.

On the first one (see above), I was East and opened 1♥ on a 1-5-6-1 sixteen-count (for which the singleton ♠Queen was of dubious value). I could not open 1♦ because the hand was far below values to reverse. After a 1♠ overcall, partner bid 3♥ pre-emptively, and my RHO bid 4♠. Not being blessed with 20/20 hindsight, and not being willing to defend, I bid 5♦, a lead-directing bid for partner in the event that the opponents bid 5♠, and when my LHO doubled, partner corrected to 5♥.

Because of my two black suit singletons, and Hearts splitting 2/2, 5♥ was cold. Because partner held the ♣Ace opposite

my singleton, we can actually beat 4♠ by two tricks (although neither of us had a hand which could double the opponents for +500); +450 garnered all the matchpoints.

The second hand was even more interesting. I opened 1♥ with the East hand on a 2-5-6-0 twelve-count (and, again, with the doubleton ♠Queen being of questionable value). I again opened 1♥ with a poor suit, my LHO doubled, and partner bid 3♥ pre-emptively with his 5-5-2-1 shape and 6 HCPs. My RHO made the good bid of 5♣ (and against which I must lead the ♦Ace to hold the contract to 5). Again, not willing to defend, I bid 5♦, pass by my RHO, and partner again corrected to 5♥, which was doubled.

On perfect defense, this goes down one trick against the opponents’ cold game. The ♣Queen was led, I ruffed, and a led a trump. However, the defenders failed to find the Spade shift from KJ104, and I made the contract, for +650 and all the matchpoints when the Diamond suit allowed for pitching four of dummy’s losing spades.

The theme for this article: *the more shape you have, the fewer HCP you need to make game, and defending is generally incorrect.*

# MASTERPOINT RACES

## Top Three 2016 Winners by Masterpoint Range

**Mini-McKenney** medallions are awarded to the players in each Unit, one per ranking level, who earn the *most total master points* during the previous year. All points of any color and source are counted. **Ace of Clubs** certificates are awarded to the players in each Unit, one per ranking level, who earn *the most master points in club games* during the calendar year. Only black points are counted; points earned in STaCs and other special games paying "pigmented" points don't count. The awards are not mutually exclusive; it's possible to win either or both in the same year. The level you compete in is the one within which you started the year.

## KOHN'S KORNER #4

### Preemption: Part II

The use of *Inverted Minor Suit Raises*, where the jump raise shows 5-card (or more) support but less than 10 high card points, is an excellent method to interfere with the opponents' auctions. A jump bid in partner's Major suit opening, showing 4-card support but, less than 7 high card points, is also a preemptive tool. This is a method advanced by Marty Bergen. The bid of 3♦ over partner's opening of one of a Major now shows a limit (10-12 high card points) raise with four card support. 3♣ shows a constructive raise (7-9 high card points)

Another excellent method to preempt an auction is a jump raise of partner's overcalls. When partner overcalls an opening bid and you hold 4 or more cards in his suit, but limited values (points), make a preemptive jump bid. With a stronger hand (9 or more high card points), make a cue bid in the opponent's suit to show those values.

One of the best preemptive tools occurs when partner opens one of a Major and you hold 5-card (or more) support, very limited values, and a singleton or void in an outside suit. In this case, raise your partner's Major suit to game. You may even make your contract, but you will certainly make it very difficult for the opponents.

# NO-SUIT BRIDGE

One of the less-heralded discoveries of MER – that’s the Mars Exploration Rover for all you dummies out there – is that a variation of our game, called No-Suit Bridge, was played on the Red Planet only a couple of eons ago. This form of bridge became hugely popular, spreading from Sea to Shining Martian Sea and finally to other planets in the hood. It never made an impact on Earth Bridge but you know how stubborn we Neanderthals were (and still are!). Otherwise, No-Suit Bridge went platinum, Solar System-wise, and spawned a host of spiffy, if short-lived, bidding systems. But I digress.

## No-Suit Bridge Revealed

No-Suit contracts may be played at any level from 1 to 7 in any of the four No-Suits, which are termed No-Clubs, No-Diamonds, No-Hearts, and No-Spades.

A No-Suit contract is played like a No-Trump contract, except that the No-Suit is “forbidden”; that is, *no player may ever lead that Suit at any point in play.*

In the event that a player is on lead with nothing but No-Suit cards left – a situation as painful as it is despicable – the lead must be relinquished to the player to the left of the miscreant.

In the event that all four players are stuck with unleadable No-Suit cards, there will accordingly be fewer than 13 tricks available to the declarer and the defense, combined. Better players are adept at avoiding such traps, colloquially known as “falling into the gutter.”

In view of the possible – in fact likely – predicament cited above, players new to No-Suit Bridge should beware of bidding high-level Suit contracts, because all cards they hold in the No-Suit are losers from the get-go.

Think about it: do not bid, say, 7 No-Spades without a void in Spades, unless you are certain that partner has a long Suit suitable for pitching your Spades on.

In a No-Suit contract, a clever declarer or defender will discard No-Suit cards as early as convenient and legal, since such cards are useless nuisances.

Trick values for No-Suits are the same as for Suits, except that each “first trick” is worth 5 more points.

A No-Suit bid ranks just above the equivalent Suit bid. Thus, at the one-level, the possible range of bids, given in order of increasing rank, is as follows:

1♣, 1 No-♣, 1♦, 1 No-♦, 1♥, 1 No-♥, 1♠, 1 No-♠, 1 NT

Are you ready to see No-Suit Bridge in action? Here’s a hand from the Sol System Semis, Mars vs Jupiter, played at South Mars City on June 16, Star-Date -811,477:

1. Plutonians would have opened this hand 1♣, which in their Timid Club system showed a max of 0 HCP.
2. Venusian experts favored opening a hand like this with their Outlandish 1♠, showing in advance 3-card support for what they *hoped* would be partner’s 5-card Spade Suit.
3. A typically conservative Jovian opening bid. But stay tuned!
4. Martians habitually had allergic reactions to enemy Spade bids,
5. (Yawn)
6. Legend has it that this Pass was made in exquisitely proper tempo.
7. Presumptive wretch! Durst think to intimidate *moi*?
8. Yea, verily, I doth durst!
9. Did anybody order pizza yet?
10. With any other Martian, I’d raise to 7, but I’ve played with this turkey before!
11. Untranslatable. Ruled a Pass by the Uranian TD, plus a harsh 20-IMP (Interplanetary Match Point) penalty.

## WHAT'S NEW IN DUPLICATE?

By the time you read this, a representative of the Bridge Company will have given a demo of its **Bridge+More** system at the conclusion of a Unit 141 sectional event in January, 2017 at the Bala Golf Club in Philadelphia.

Here's a brief description:

- A dealing device sits on each table. There are no boards to pass.
- A central server, synched to a computer, downloads hands electronically to each dealing device.
- Cards are dealt in real time, the next hand being dealt (*quietly*, we are told) while the current hand is being played. Each table therefore needs two card decks.
- Electronic scoring and hand record generation are included
- Unspecified bells and whistles are also available for those who want to add them.

This may or may not become the system of choice for duplicate tournaments in the future. Prices for the system are not listed on the Bridge Company website.

The cost may exceed what smallish clubs can afford – or not. For larger clubs and for events at the sectional level or higher, **Bridge+More** might be what we encounter at some point before we have, uh, “shuffled” off this mortal coil.

If you want to know more, here are a few facts derived from the “About Us” tab on the company's home page:

- The Bridge Company's headquarters is in Denmark.
- It is owned by a group of private investors.
- **Bridge+More** was first used at an international tournament in January 2015 at the Copenhagen Bridge Invitational.
