## A HAND EVALUATION LESSON

## by Eli Duttman

his article is directed toward the intermediate/advancing player, but an advanced player may find something of value.

Instead of functioning as mindless adding machines, I ask the readership to *exercise judgment*. Given the popular 15-17 range for strong 1NT openings, the following hand should be opened 1NT in spite of the 18-count, which simple addition of HCP yields.

- AQ7
- ♥ KQ5
- ♦ KJ2
- ♣ QJ83

Milton Work's 4/3/2/1 count undervalues Aces and 10s, while overvaluing Queens and Jacks. The example contains a plethora of Queens and Jacks, along with a dearth of Aces and Tens. Not good!

A 4=3=3=3 distribution whose "long" suit has poor texture exhibits *little* playing strength. Not good!

The Italian "bulk control" count allocates 2 to an Ace and 1 to a King. This hand contains four bulk controls, which is only one better than the average of three. That's not impressive.

Applying the Losing Trick Count to the example initially yields one Spade loser, one Heart loser, two Diamond losers, and two Club losers. The initial total is six losers. Because the hand contains three Queens and only one Ace, an additional loser is added to the count, for a total of seven. Seven losers is what a minimum opening bid exhibits. "Something is rotten in the State of Denmark."

The hand contains:  $1\frac{1}{2}$  quick tricks (q/t) in Spades, 1 q/t in Hearts,  $\frac{1}{2}$  q/t and a tiny plus in Diamonds, and a strong plus in Clubs. The q/t total is 3 and a very strong plus approaching  $\frac{1}{2}$ . S. Garton Churchill stated that a weak NT contains 2.5 to 3+ q/t. By the q/t metric, this hand barely qualifies as a strong NT.

All the metric methods, except the Work Count, do not hold the example in great favor. The hand is a strong 1NT and no more.

If the auction proceeds 1 - (Pass) - 1 / 1 / 1 - (Pass) - 2NT, the partnership will, all too often, end up in a game contract with **poor** prospects. There are also times that 2NT fails, such as when partner barely scraped up a response to 1 - 2.

Folks, please think, instead of mechanically hitting the calculator keys.

## ROUGH WATERS vs CALM SEAS

### Triple Heartbreak at the NAOBC

t was one of those black swan events: three boards, three low scores, all due to the Heart suit, all in the same match. To make matters worse, this triple "heart break" did not occur in a regular club game but during the second session of the qualifying round of the 0-1500 Premier Pairs event of the Winter NAOBC held this past March on BBO.


The first cut came on board #7. With all vulnerable and partner as dealer, I am North holding 11 HCP:

**♠**J ♥QJ9852 ♦A10 ♣QJ92.

#### The bidding:

North (Me)	East	South (Partner)	West
		1 •	2 🏟
3♥	Pass	3NT	Pass
4♥	Pass	Pass	Pass

The entire hand is revealed as follows:



East leads the ♠2 and I go down two tricks, earning only 13.3% on the board. By contrast, depending on West's lead, partner either makes one or two over tricks in 3NT which would have earned us either 43.3% or 65% on the board. Even 5♣ makes for a score of 33.3%.


The first cut is followed by a jab with board #10. Again with all vulnerable and East as dealer, I find myself in the fourth seat holding 18 HCP in this hand:

♠ KQ5 ♥ AK104 ◆QJ ♣QJ62.

#### The bidding:

North (Me)	East	South (Partner)	West
	Pass	Pass	Pass
1*	Pass	Pass	Pass

The entire hand is revealed as follows:



East leads the ♥6 and I go down two tricks, earning only 21.3% on the board. By contrast, irrespective of West's lead, 2♥ makes, earning us 71.7%. Even 3♥ going down one earns us 53.3%. Of course, 4♥ going down two earns N-S the same as us, namely, 21.3%.


Finally, the knockout punch is delivered on board #14. This time with no one vulnerable and East as dealer, I find myself holding 19 HCP in this hand after a 3 • opening bid by West:

**♦**K86 ♥Q92 ♦AK43 **♣**AK4

The bidding:

North (Me)	East	South (Partner)	West

West leads the ◆Q, and though it is possible to hold the contract to down one, we go down two tricks, earning only 15% on the board. By contrast, depending on East's lead, 3NT either goes down one, makes 3NT, or makes an overtrick, earning us 36.7%, 73.3%, or 93.3%, respectively. 4♥ going down one trick would have earned us the same as 3NT going down one trick; that is, 36.7%. By the way, on a weak defense, four N-S pairs managed to make 4♥, earning them 85%.

Readers can try bidding these hands with their partners and decide for themselves whether the calls partner and I

made (or did not make) in the heat of competition were appropriate. Clearly, based on the outcomes, they were not. However, the astute player knows that in bridge, decisions cannot be judged on particular outcomes. The whole point is that, more often than not, optimal calls will result in the better outcomes. On any other day, perhaps the calls partner and I made would have been optimal.

On a more positive note, in spite of these three boards seriously hurting our ranking during the qualifying event, partner and I moved on to compete in the final day of play.

## THIS 'N THAT FROM YOUR DISTRICT #3 DIRECTOR

[Editor's Note: This communication was received by Brett Kunin, President of the NJBL Board of Directors Unit 140.]

The ACBL Board just concluded its spring meetings looking forward to a probable return to FTF bridge beginning in the third quarter. As of now, Regionals are projected for the fourth quarter, but state and local authorities appear to be loosening restrictions and adult vaccinations may be completed by June, allowing clubs and sectionals to resume during the summer, and possibly creating demand for Regionals as early as September.

2020 financials show a gain of about \$2.7 million, more than double the total for 2019, thanks to the rapid adjustment to the COVID-19 pandemic and enthusiasm for online bridge.

A "clean" audit was completed last week.

The meetings were focused on:

- Organizational issues (principally By-Law and Codification revisions) resulting from the reorganization approved last year;
- Review of the substantially increased volume of Appeals and Charges activity due to online ethical charges; and,
- 3. Focus on the post-pandemic future of online and FTF bridge.

As you will have observed from the latest ACBL Bulletin, a great deal of effort was expended in orchestrating the joint ACBL and BBO response to the pandemic, and the ACBL Strategic Committee picked up the ball to lead vigorous discussion on the issues that the Board and management will need to address in the months ahead, including:

- 1. How to motivate FTF participation;
- 2. A likely decline in the number of clubs; and,
- 3. The need to mitigate risk for NABCs and Regionals over at least the year ahead.

Management is working on development of criteria governing the earliest FTF tournaments, which will need to be handled on a case-to-case basis.

Your District Board will be meeting in April to address our share of the same issues, and hopefully to plan to work with the ACBL for a successful return to tournament bridge in Danbury in October. We hope to see you there!

## TALK AROUND THE TABLE

## by Ken Trock

#### **Hand #1**

Playing MPs in an online club game with a pickup partner, I'm dealt, in 4<sup>th</sup> seat: ♠A102=♥AJ84=♠76=♠J542. With no one vulnerable, the bidding goes:

<u>North</u>	<u>East</u>	<u>South</u>	West
1♦	Pass	1NT	Pass
3♦	Pass	3NT	All Pass

I'm thinking about my opening lead, probably a Heart, when partner types into the chat window, "Your lead partner, make it an aggressive one." *Excuse me*: "Make it an aggressive one"?! *You can't say that*! I'm waiting for the opponents to complain or call the director, but nothing happens. Which goes to show that it's a good idea for at least one person per partnership to keep their chat window open. Maybe I should call the director myself, maybe the board is fouled anyway, but I carry on. Chatty partner is probably right, an aggressive lead is called for, but I can't do that now. So I lead a Diamond.

Dummy hits with ♠J84= ♥KQ10=♦AKQJ94=♣3.

Declarer holds ★K93=♥752=◆102=★KQ1086.

As it happens, most non-Diamond leads give declarer a trick and maybe a tempo. We sweat thru six rounds of Diamonds and, with careful defense, hold declarer to nine tricks. Most others make ten. An undeserved good board.

#### Hand #2

MPs. This time I'm White on Red and in 2nd seat, holding: ♠void=♥63=♠AJ3=♣QJ1098752.


I hear 1♣ on my right. When I inquire about the bid, the nice lady says her Club holding is AK3! Wow, that's pretty forthcoming. And totally consistent with our Club holding. So how do I get in here, non-vulnerable with my real Clubs? 2♣ is Michaels, 3♣ is usually played as asking partner if they have a Club stopper, and if they do, bid 3NT. I don't want that either. How about 4♣ with my 8-bagger? That should be natural but seems unnecessary so soon. So I pass for now. LHO bids 1♠, partner passes, RHO bids 1NT. To be honest, I'm not sure what stopped me from bidding 2♣ or 3♣ (natural) now, but I didn't. LHO

bid 2♠, raised to 3♠ by RHO. Well I'm certainly not doing anything now! LHO accepts the invitation with 4♠, passed around.

I'm pretty sure this is going down. They may have a 50-50 chance to make with normal breaks, which they're not getting. RHO told me she has three Clubs. Since she opened a Club her shape must be 4-3-3-3. That means declarer will be stuck with losers. Partner led a Club, and predictably declarer took an early pitch on the \*AK, ruffed by partner, who also had a couple of high Spades after that and a high Heart. I also have the \*A. Down two. Glad I didn't enter this auction.

#### **Hand #3**

MPs. Now I'm South, destined to become dummy.



#### The bidding:

<u>North</u>	<u>East</u>	South	<u>West</u>
Pass	Pass	1♦	Pass
1♥	Pass	2♥	All Pass

This one could go several ways. Does the South hand qualify for a 1NT opener? Probably. But then we get to 3NT thru Stayman and there's no story to tell.

The play could go a couple of ways too. A low Spade was led! No harm. Declarer, North, won in dummy, came back to hand with the •A and led a Spade, won by East with the Ace, who got out with a Diamond, won high in dummy.

Now comes something I see as declarer fairly often. When I have the count on a suit and start ruffing losers, I cross my fingers that the defense won't ruff in ahead of me and compromise my trump holding. Most of the time,

they don't. In this auction all North did was bid 1♥. There's no reason to assume their Heart holding is solid. So when a low Diamond is led off the board, West should ruff in, chipping away at declarer's trump holding. I think the ♥7 would be plenty high. It forces out the Queen. If declarer should get back to the board later and try it again, West's trumps are high.

Of course, it's easier when you as defender and dummy are out of a suit and declarer leads it out of hand. We see the trump holding on board. So when the 3<sup>rd</sup> round of Clubs is played out of hand, East has a decision. And again it's easier when we see all four hands. Still, it's probably right for East to ruff in with the Jack, forcing out the Ace.

Our opponents simply sluffed other cards on the crossruff and my partner came to ten tricks. At the end, the defensive trump tricks fell on each other. On defense, think about uppercutting in these situations – but just not against me!:)

Hopefully, with the advent of three successful vaccines, we can foresee an eventual end to the pandemic, despite the recent surge of cases in our state. The staggering death toll in the U.S. has sobered everyone, and almost all of us have lost someone we knew or admired.

Although the ACBL has suffered a decline of 11,500 members in the past year (over 7% of the existing membership), the decrease in the ranks of our Unit is less than 3%. Nevertheless, there is hope on the horizon, as the ACBL actually gained members for the first time in 12 months in March. As most of you are aware, the ACBL has cancelled all National, Regional and Sectional tournaments through July, but is hoping to see the growth of face-to-face ("ftf") bridge as clubs gradually reopen. In order to be assigned to a tournament, the ACBL has issued a directive that any ACBL director must have provided proof of vaccination.

Locally, the Fairfield Regional in June has been cancelled. The North Americans Pairs district final is scheduled for Saturday, October 9, and will be *virtual*. A decision as to whether to hold a Regional in Danbury (scheduled the following week) will be made by District 3 at the end of June.

In addition, our Unit, at this point, intends to hold its first *ftf* Sectional since March, 2020 on December 10-12, 2021 at our new and permanent home, the Polish Cultural Foundation in Clark, NJ. Our new facility is not only far superior to our former one but is 40% larger and has excellent parking. We urge you to reserve the dates; more details will follow in the fall.

Finally, kudos to our virtual clubs for providing an outlet while we weather the pandemic, and a grateful thank you to all of our non-Board volunteers upon whom we have relied to continue their outstanding service to the Unit.

In the interim, I urge all of you to get vaccinated if you haven't already done so, to continue *all* Covid-19 precautions, and to stay safe.

## A. M. TURING AWARD WINNER

### **AL AHO**

am pleased to announce that a bridge player from our Unit, Al Aho, who often played on weekends at the Shrine Bridge Center before the pandemic, received the 2020 A. M. Turing Award from the Association of Computer Machinery (ACM). The A. M. Turing Award, the ACM's most prestigious technical award is named for Alan M. Turing, a famous British mathematician. It is given for major contributions of lasting importance to computing and is often referred to the as the "Nobel Prize of Computing."

I have played against Al frequently, and although I knew that he resides in Chatham and is Professor Emeritus of Computer Science at Columbia, I had no

idea that this intelligent, soft spoken man is so accomplished. He and Jeffrey Ullman of Stanford shared the award for nine collaborative textbooks on fundamental algorithms and theory used by millions of software programmers around the world.

The award, sponsored by Google, carries a prize of \$1 million, and I thought it important for all bridge players in the Unit to know of his amazing career and contributions.
