Submissions for publications will be chosen at random. If yours doesn't make it the first time around, it will receive priority for the next edition.


### When Your System Gives You the Answer

Sitting in 4th position, I was dealt  $\blacktriangle$  AK  $\blacktriangledown$  --  $\blacklozenge$  A1064  $\clubsuit$  AKJ10653. If it were first position, I'd open  $2\clubsuit$  with 9 1/2 tricks and rebid  $3\clubsuit$ . After my lefthand opponent passes, my Partner opens  $2\blacktriangledown$ ! We don't preempt with junk, especially in 2nd position. So, I bid 2NT, asking for a feature. It can't be Clubs: I have the Ace and King. It can't be Spades: I have the Ace and King there too. If Partner only has Hearts, he'll bid  $3\blacktriangledown$ , and I'll bid 3NT. However, he bids  $3\blacklozenge$  showing me the  $\blacklozenge$ K, exactly what I wanted to hear. Very few systems show the Queen of the non-trump suit, but I bid  $6\clubsuit$ , hoping that either Partner has the  $\blacklozenge$ Q or is short in Diamonds so I can ruff a loser or two. It turns out the  $\clubsuit$ Q drops in 2 rounds, and not only does Partner have the  $\blacklozenge$ Q, but Diamonds behave nicely. Making 7 gives us a tie for top and helps us finish second overall.



# Bidding of Powerhouse Hands For Intermediate and Advancing Players

On this first example, to your surprise, your RHO opens 1♦ with you holding


♠ A8x ♥ A753 ♦ Ax ♣ AKQx, a good quality 2NT opener if you were in 1st seat. You ponder what to bid: 1NT would be an egregious underbid, 2NT would show Clubs and Hearts, and therefore, your only choice is to double. Your LHO passes, Partner bids 1♠, and you can either cue bid 2♦ or bid 1NT. You are a 1/2 trick light for a cue bid, but since a direct 1NT overcall would have been a good 15 to a bad 18 HCP, you elect to bid 1NT now, which should be a balanced 19-21 HCP. LHO passes again, and Partner bids 2♠, showing at least 5, and more likely 6 Spades. RHO passes, and with first and third round control of Diamonds, your hand has improved, and you raise partner's 2♠ bid to 3♠, showing a maximum with at least high honor-3rd of Spades, and Diamonds under control. Note that it is incorrect to bid game directly. as Partner could hold 5 or 6 Spades to the 9, and no outside honors. LHO passes. However, Partner holds ◆ QJ9542 ♥ 94 ◆ Txx ♣ Tx, and reevaluates his hand, knowing that if Partner (you) has Axx in Spades, on the auction, the ♠K is "in the slot". He realizes that his 3 count and 6 card suit is really a gold mine and raises to game.

### Opening Lead: ♣7

Partner plays the hand well, playing 3 rounds of Clubs, pitching a losing Heart with the opening leader ruffing with a small Spade. The ◆K is now played, Partner wins the Ace, plays ♥A and ruffs a Heart. Then takes the Spade finesse to make 5.

The full deal, rotated to put Partner in the South.



The lesson here is that doubling and bidding shows a 5 loser hand, doubling and cue bidding shows a 4 loser hand, and doubling and bidding 1NT should be a balanced 19-21 HCP.

On another hand, you are in 2nd chair, and after your RHO passes, you open 1♥ with

- ♠ AK87 ♥ AQJ86 ♦ A ♣ 1073. The bidding thereafter is uncontested, and Partner bids 2. You bid 2♠, which, with this Partner, is an "old-fashioned" reverse. However, even in the current bidding style where this does NOT show extra values, your call would be the same. Partner now bids 2NT, showing a Club stopper, and tends to deny 6 Diamonds. Although you have a very good 18 HCP, your hand would have improved holding a second Diamond, and the fact that Partner has no more than 2 Hearts and 3 Spades is also a negative. Partner is usually showing a minimum 2/1 bid in this auction, and without a fit, No Trump will be the desired strain. Unless Partner holds a good 15, slam is unlikely. Therefore, you make the quantitative call of 4NT, which Partner passes. Partner's hand is:
- ♣ 954 ♥ 53 ♦ KQ984 ♣ AK6. With 5 dead cards in the majors, I would have bid 1NT followed by 2NT over

a suit response, showing 11-12 without a fit, and I would not have ventured beyond 3NT. However, with 3 sure tricks in his hand in 2 suits, Partner's call was not unreasonable.

Let us look at this hand from a defensive perspective, and that you are on lead with

♠ 10 ♥ K972 ◆ J10652 ♣ Q52. Believe it or not, the standout lead is the singleton ♠10! Based on the auction, since the opener neither rebid Spades nor Hearts, his likely shape is 45xx, and Partner MUST hold at least 5 Spades. My second choice would be a Club from Qxx, with both leads attempting to establish tricks in the black suits. Note that Partner is hard pressed to make 5NT on a Spade lead. This particular defender elected (poorly) by leading the ◆J, and now with the Heart finesse working, my Partner was the only one in the room to make a second overtrick. A few players made 4, about half the field made 5NT.

The mantras here are: (1) NOT to be a rigid point counter, and that forcing to slam was not warranted in this auction; and (2) without a fit of any kind, the value of each hand is diminished, as long suits are more difficult to set up.

The full deal, again rotated to put Partner in the South.

### **A Normal Result**

This is a fairly typical layout. North opens 1♥ and South makes a semi-forcing 1NT bid. North, with a flat 13 HCP passes. West leads their 4th best Spade, won by East with the ♠K and returns the suit. Declarer lets it ride around to the ♠A on the board and goes after Clubs. West winds the 2nd Club and pushes a Heart thru Dummy. Eventually Declarer will come to 2 Spades, 1 Heart, and 4 Clubs. They may guess Diamonds correctly or the defense could be forced to lead one to them at the end. I'd say on this defense that North/South will take 8 tricks. Does this seem like a normal result? Can the defense do any better?

What if East doesn't take their ♠K at trick 1? This will make Declarer burn their entry to the long Clubs early. They wouldn't be able to run that suit later. Note that Declarer probably wouldn't benefit by ducking trick 1 either. East could continue with a small Spade, ostensibly now giving away a trick, but Declarer can win the ♠Q now or never. Or they could switch to Hearts. My guess is that with East ducking the opening Spade lead, that Declarer will only take 6 tricks.

This principle comes up when responder bids a nonforcing 1NT over opener's bid. They have a long minor they couldn't bid, often Clubs, and not much else. The defense strives to not allow them to use it.



My preference is to almost never open or make a preemptive jump to show a weak-two bid with a 7 card suit. I prefer the traditional good 6 card suit although unfavorable vulnerability has led me to do it at least once. But I don't recall any triumphs, and confusion for Partner seems rather weighty. In this BBO team match deal, the maneuver indirectly gained an advantage for an unlikely reason; Partner's thoughtful defensive play was made possible by Declarer's confusion about the weak-two length.

The replay table saw North open a more traditional 3♠ at favorable vulnerability, leading to East overcalling the value bid of 3NT, which ended the auction. 4♠ doubled might be a profitable sacrifice at -300, but in all likelihood, West might then bid 5♠ for about the same +600 East-West making result. There, the opening trick went ♠J, Q, K, A of Spades as ducking didn't seem to be necessary to sever defensive communications. Declarer, East, of course had to prevent North from gaining the lead to cash their high spades, as they tackled the critical Diamond suit.

When a low Diamond was next led towards Dummy's suit headed by the ◆AJT, the intention was not to take a finesse that could easily give the lead to North

holding the King or Queen. Declarer was going to rise with the Ace hoping to drop a singleton ◆Q or ◆K in the North, then clear the suit to the "safe opponent", South, with the other high honor. Even if South held ◆KQx and this would yield 2 tricks for the defense, it could not prevent East-West from taking 9 tricks to fulfill the 3NT contract. The other reasonable possibility was, as in the actual case, finding the defender's Diamonds 2-2, and on the second round of that suit, South must be the one with the King.

South was aware of the issues here and tried to muddy the waters by playing the •K when that suit was led at trick 2. Declarer refrained from the losing strategy of capturing that with Dummy's •A. They simply let that card hold the trick. After regaining the lead from the Club shift, East then led a second Diamond towards Dummy's •AJT and went up Ace to achieve a successful result. As before, they didn't mind if South had •KQx to start, as the contract would still be safe.

The seemingly impregnable 3NT contract was also reached here via the auction shown, with East expecting North to hold a six card suit. They accordingly made the quite reasonable play of ducking the first round of Spades by letting North's ♠K hold the trick. This was to cut South's ability to reach their Partner in Spades should they be divided the expected 6-2.

North continued Spades of course, and now East took their Ace. South was free to discard on that, and a spectacular choice was made. Quite aware of the criticality of the Diamond suit and needing partner to have the •Q, they jettisoned their •K on the second round of Spades. There was now no way for East-West to produce 9 tricks without giving dangerous North the lead. In fact, the result was down 3, -300 for a hefty IMP loss when they eventually continued attacking Diamonds on a hope and a prayer.

The old fashioned weak-two with 6 may have gone bye-bye with the Flintstones here, but one cannot say the new-fangled Jettistons didn't rock the boat!
